1. Discussion focused on Marilyn's report comparing facilities at the Hilton and the Ramada. Marilyn indicated that although the Hilton has greater aesthetic appeal, the requirement that we have over 100 occupied rooms at \$90 per night (double occupancy, i.e., 200 guests staying at the Hilton) or pay \$2900 for the conference facilities puts the Hilton at greater financial risk for the Conference budget. Members present also discussed at length the seating capacity for break-out rooms at each facility and determined that although the Hilton has marginally better facilities, Marilyn suggested that the Ballroom at the Ramada could accomodate "round table discussions" in which those not interested or not able to find seating at one of the regular sessions could hold informal discussions on preselected topics. Members present also discussed the problem of seating capacity for meals at the Ramada and suggested that lunch might be held in shifts and that if attendance figures were substantially over the 400 person capacity of the Ballroom, a rival trip to WEM could draw excess crowds away from the Saturday evening banquet. General consensus was reached that the Conference should be held at the Ramada.

Attached is a representative selection of comparative statistics.

Here's the longer message I promised.....

1) We (Lise, Joanne, Carolyn, Stella and I) had a very productive meeting. We clarified the objectives of our proposal for Edmonton, developed strategies and a plan of action, as well as a framework for proposal writing. We also developed a two stage plan (stage 1 - Edmonton; stage 2 - Toronto) since we thought it impossible to implement all of our ideas for november.

2) OUR objectives are the following:

We do not want to compete for the same money that conference organizers might be applying for so we need to coordinate. I should have more information on this next week.

IMPOSSIBILITY OF PERFORMANCE - It is expressly agreed that each party shall be relieved of its obligations under this Agreement in the event and to the extent the performance of this Agreement is delayed or prevented by any cause reasonably beyond its control, including, without limitation, acts of God, and acts or orders of governmental authorities, or by fire, flood or explosion, sale of the Hotel, necessary and essential construction, disruption of utility services, arrest or seizure under legal process, strike, lockout or work stoppage or other restraint of labour either partial or general, from whatever cause; but if and when the occurrence or condition which delayed or prevented such performance shall cease and be removed, it shall be the obligation of the Hotel or the Group, as the case may be, without further delay to commence the correction of such performance or confirm the correction thereof.

10. *DAMAGE TO THE HOTEL PREMISES - The Group accepts the responsibility for any damage to the Hotel premises caused by Group members or independent contractors employed by the Group during the time that any portion of the Hotel premises are under the Group's control.*
11. *CANCELLATION AND LIQUIDATED DAMAGES - Under the terms of this Agreement, the Hotel is reserving in the name of the Group, the Guestroom requirements and Meeting, Banquet (food and beverage) and Exhibit Requirements set forth herein. In the event these reserved facilities and services are not used, the Hotel will experience significant monetary losses. Therefore, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 5, should the Group cancel this Agreement, the Group agrees to pay the Hotel as liquidated damages a charge equivalent to the appropriate percentage (%) of the total value of the Guestroom Requirements reserved for the night of highest occupancy scheduled by the Group in Section 2 hereof as dictated by the following table:*

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 5, should the Group fail to confirm more than 50% of the Guestroom Requirements as described in Section 2, the Group agrees to pay the Hotel as liquidated damages a charge equivalent to the total value of the Guestroom Requirements reserved for the night of the highest occupancy scheduled by the Group in Section 2 hereof.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 5, should the Group cancel any of the Meeting, Banquet (food and beverage), and Exhibition Requirements within 30 days of the date upon which it is reserved, or fail to honour more than 50% of the revenue value of any Meeting, Banquet (food and beverage) or Exhibition Requirements as detailed in Section 4, the Group agrees to pay to the Hotel as Liquidated Damages a charge equivalent to 100% of the anticipated revenue for that function, meeting or exhibit facility.

12. *CONTRACT - These meeting space requirements and guestroom requirements are reserved on a tentative basis. The Hotel reserves the right to release the meeting space and guestroom requirements for resale after discussion between the Group and the Hotel, until such time as a signed copy of this Agreement is returned to the Hotel and accepted by the Hotel. Once this agreement is mutually agreed upon, the requirements will then be considered definite.*


