## NEW GLOBAL DATA COUNT SHOWS HOW MANY WOMEN AND CHILDREN SEEK HELP TO ESCAPE FROM VIOLENCE

Today, on International Women's Day, we, the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters, are joining the Global Network of Women's Shelters to release the results of the 2011 Global Data Count.

On just one day around the world 56,308 women and 39,130 children sought refuge from domestic violence at women's shelters.

Not everyone received help: 7,608 women and 4,734 children were turned away. A total of 12,342 women and children were subject to continued risk.

The 2011 Global Data Count is a snapshot of one day in the lives of women seeking refuge at women's shelters around the world. It is the third census conducted by the Global Network of Women's Shelters. It represents information provided by 2,636 participating shelters and 25 shelter networks from 36 countries.

In our Alberta our shelters helped 744 women and 606 children. And this, we know, is just the tip of ice berg. Most violence is unreported; many women and children suffer alone; and there are limited resources available.

The data count also enabled the voices of survivors to be heard from around the world: As we heard from a women in a shelter in Estonia, "If I were not here, I would probably be dead."

From a shelter resident in the Netherlands: "It sounds funny perhaps, but to me those first days in shelter were like heaven. A room for myself and my children. No eyes staring at me, wanting to control everything I did. A safe place, were people were caring and took interest in me as a person and mother."

The Data Count shows that violence against women is truly an international issue that demands a response from every country in the world.
