What is the Women's Research Centre?

The Women's Research Centre is an institute for feminist research including action research conducted in the women's community.

Why have a Women's Research Centre?

The Centre is designed to be a place for feminist researchers to meet and work regardless of their organizational affiliation.

One of the Centre's objectives is to make it possible for feminist researchers to share their work-in-progress.

What is feminist research?

Feminist research, for us, is woman-centred research and research which recognizes the unequal position of women in society. This research is oriented toward changing that position.

Feminist research is a broad category. Widely differing theoretical and empirical interests within feminist research are welcome at the Centre. There is no attempt to imply a single all-encompassing view of feminism at the Centre.

What does feminist research look like?

Research is the process used to acquire knowledge about any topic of interest.

This process may include action-research in which individuals or groups incorporate a systematic way of gathering information and evaluating their actions.

In collaborative research, researchers work with others to discover specific ways of sharing the research process. Both share interest in the outcomes of the research.

In co-operative research, two or more researchers work as a team on a topic.

In individual research, a researcher grounds her work in her own life-experience and feminist practise but works essentially alone to achieve research goals.

Feminist research can initiate change on personal and societal levels. Immediate outcomes include political lobbying, group action and personal empowerment.

How is the Centre organized?

The Women's Research Centre was established jointly by Athabasca University and the University of Alberta in 1988.

The Centre will be coordinated by a board of seven people drawn from the membership. Four of the seven positions will be appointed by vice-presidents of the two sponsoring universities. The remaining three will be designated by the membership.

When funding becomes available, there will be a Centre Coordinator and office staff, as well as research assistantship positions.

At present, however, the Centre relies upon minimal office assistance and volunteer labour.

Meetings of the membership provide advice to the board and elect new board members to it.
