Ursula Franklin, Professor of Metallurgy and Materials Science at the University of Toronto, will be a Distinguished Guest Lecturer at the University of Alberta from February 22 to March 7, 1987. Dr. Franklin obtained her PhD in experimental physics from the Technical University Berlin, and continued her studies with post-doctoral research in the Departments of Physics and Metallurgical Engineering at the University of Toronto.

In addition to her appointment in the Department of Metallurgy and Materials Science, Dr. Franklin is an Affiliate of the University's Institute for the History and Philosophy of Science and Technology, and a Research Associate of the Royal Ontario Museum. She has pioneered the application of modern materials science techniques to the study of archaeological materials and has published and taught extensively in this field. Dr. Franklin also took part in the development of courses on the social impact of technology for undergraduates in the Faculty of Engineering.

Since 1980, Dr. Franklin has been director of the University of Toronto's Collegium

Archaeometricum, an interdisciplinary group of scholars from the University and the Royal Ontario

Museum engaged in joint teaching and research in Archaeometry. Supported by a development grant

from the Connaught Fund, the Collegium is at present the only such group in Canada.

In addition to her productive scholarly life, Dr. Franklin, a Quaker by religious affiliation, has participated in many public activities related to peace, international understanding, and the role of women in society. She is an active member of Voice of Women, a national organization of women whose main focus is against war or the threat of war as the accepted method of exercising power.

Because of her concern about democratic decision making on questions relative to heavy technological components, Dr. Franklin has provided technical advice and background information to many community groups, particularly on subjects such as pollution, radiation and, most recently, the use of aluminum in home wiring. She has written and co-produced radio programs on science, technology and public policy.

Dr. Franklin will be giving four public lectures while at the University of Alberta (see "Talks" section for detailed listings). Her visit is sponsored by the Vice-President's (Academic) Advisory Committee on Women's Studies and WISEST, with financial assistance from the Distinguished Visitor's Fund.

Dear Jean,

Thank you so much for your letter of October 28, reminding me of my promise for the lecture titles.

Please feel free to schedule them at times and places that seem appropriate to you. I put myself entirely into your good hands.

Numbers three and four should follow chronologically, but the other two are independent of each other:

- 1. "A Feminist Critique of Peace Research". In this lecture I would like to trace the history of the peace research movement, particularly in Canada, which now spans 25 -30 years. I would like to show how the concept of "peace", as well as the concept of "research, has changed over these decades and how peace research, seen from a feminist perspective, has not and could not yield the results that were promised or anticipated.
- 2. "Women in Extra-parliamentary Opposition Reflections on 25 years of Voice of Women in Canada." In this lecture I would like to bring out two points; one is that the extra-parliamentary opposition, that is, people outside rather than inside parliament, has been the source of new thought and policy intervention far more than the official parliamentary opposition. I would like to illustrate the changing dynamics of the interaction between the parliamentary and the extra-parliamentary opposition. In doing so, I hope to illustrate the changing relationship between the citizens of Canada and their governments on municipal, provincial and federal levels. Furthermore, I

would like to show the place of Voice of Women not only in the Canadian peace movement, but also in the women's movement and particularly the links between the two. There is and/has been a role of women's organizations (and again, particularly of Voice of Women) in providing leadership training for women who then moved into either the environmental movement, the feminist movement or into human rights and development concerns.

I think this is an interesting subject, not just because of one organization but, because of the role of women in this extra-parliamentary opposition. Since there is much to be said on this, we may want to think of follow-up in smaller discussions, (through the small group meetings that you mention $\dot{c}d$)

The other two lectures I would put together under the title "Complexity and Context". The first would have the subtitle "Looking into the Future of Scientific Enquiries" and the second would be subtitled "Looking into the Future of the Women's Movement".

Both lectures would be concerned with new ways of posing either research questions or political and social questions in full awareness of the need to answer these questions in the context from which they arose.

In these two lectures I would like to explore the widening circle of participation, both in scientific and in social issues, that I foresee. It would also be the place to talk about the structure of groups that would carry out such endeavors.

Maybe you could let me know your reaction to these subjects and the comments of my friends such as Margaret #wn and Dallag. In the meantime, I remain with my best personal regards,



Cost Recovery Program - Canada Employment and Immigration

Further to my memo of January 3, 1986, enclosed is a copy of the newly ratified Cost Recovery Fee Schedule which will become effective February 3, 1986. Canada Employment & Immigration will charge fees for the processing of applications for permanent resident status, employment authorizations, extensions of visitor status and verifications and amendments of landing. Fees for the issuance and extension of student authorizations are still under discussion by Cabinet - any decision will be communicated to you promptly.

Please note that the fees are to be paid for the processing, not the issuance, of these documents.

For ease of reference, the following groups of temporary staff require employment authorizations (Form 1102):

Chinese Scholar
Consultant*
Eminent Individual
Exchange Professor
Graduate Assistant
Guest Lecturer
"Heritage" Scholar/Fellow*
Holders of Academic Awards
Non-Academic Staff* (foreign),
e.g. Research Assistants

Post-Doctoral Fellow
Research Associate*
Seminar Leader*
Sessional Instructor (winter term)*
Spring/Summer Instructor*
Visiting Professor
Visiting Professor (Research)
[Visiting Scientist/Scholar]

Several of the above categories also require advance validation of employment (Form 2151) — these have been marked with an asterisk. However, no separate charge is made for that Immigration form.

We have been advised that the cost recovery fees will be payable either at the Canadian Consulate/Embassy abroad where the application for permanent resident status/employment authorization is filed or at port-of-entry for those visitors whose applications may be processed directly on arrival in Canada provided they are exempted from advance validation of employment. Payment of these fees may be made in cash, certified cheque, money order, or by VISA or MasterCard (NOT American Express).

University procedures relating to the cost recovery program will be as follows:

- (1) Full-Time Continuous Faculty Appointments The fee will be reclaimable as part of the maximum removal allowance. The Comptroller's Office has been consulted and agrees. Charges should be indicated on the relevant travel claim voucher.
- (2) Temporary Staff Temporary faculty appointments who are eligible for a removal grant may also claim the \$50.00 fee which they must pay for an employment authorization as part of the maximum allowance.
- (3) Visiting Professors/Guest Lecturers and Other Short-Term Appointments from Abroad who Require Employment Authorizations - There is no established University policy regarding reimbursement of the cost recovery fee. It is suggested that depending on the case the fee may be reimbursed by the Faculty, department or trust holder, or in some cases it may have to be borne by the visitor. Faculties are free to set their own policies in that regard. If in doubt, please call this office to discuss the situation.

As far as student authorizations are concerned, please consult with the Office of International Student Affairs.

Group rates will be charged for members of a single family who are applying together for visitor extension covering the same time period. There will be one \$50.00 charge for all members of the family. If family members are accompanying an employment authorization holder, the employment authorization holder will be charged \$50.00 while the accompanying family member will be charged \$50.00 for visitor extension.

NOTE 2.

Fees for Student Authorization is under consideration. The proposed fee is \$50.00 which would be levied only once per year. The student would however be subjected to another levy where he requests a change in the terms and conditions of his authorization.



Research and Academic Activities

Structure and properties of metals and alloys, ferromagnetism, characterization of modern and ancient materials. History of technology. Social impact of technology (about 50 scholarly papers and major contributions to books).

In addition to her appointment in the Department of Metallurgy and Materials Science, Dr. Franklin is an Affiliate of the University's Institute for the History and Philosophy of Science and Technology, and a Research Associate of the Royal Ontario Museum. She has pioneered the application of modern materials science techniques to the study of archaeological materials and has published and taught extensively in this field. She took part in the development of courses on the social impact of technology for undergraduates of the Faculty of Engineering, and taught in some of them.

Since 1980, Dr. Franklin has been director of the University of Toronto's Collegium Archaeometricum, an interdisciplinary group of scholars from the University and the Royal Ontarnio Museum, engaged in joint teaching and research in Archaeometry. Supported by a development grant from the Connaught Fund the Collegium is at present the only such group in Canada.

Community Activities

In the early seventies, Dr. Franklin served for a number of years as a Director of the Deer Park Resident's Association and represented the Association on the Yonge-St. Clair task force, set up by City Council and the Planning Board to help develop the Part II Plan for the area. She has appeared on behalf of DPRA and/or the task force before the OMB, Planning Board, City Council and its Committees, and is the author of several briefs on planning and planning policies.

As a Quaker by religious affiliation, Dr. Franklin has participated in many public activities related to peace, international understanding and the role of women in society.

For a number of years, she served on the executive of the Canadian Friends Service Committee, a body that guides Quaker service in Canada and abroad.

An active member of "Voice of Women", and a member of its National Council, she was involved in many of the organization's activities, from co-ordinating the collection of children's teeth for Sr⁹⁰ measurements in the early 1960's to co-drafting submissions to the Senate inquiry into science policy and submissions to the government on social and foreign policies.

Because of her concern about democratic decision making on questions related to heavy technological components, Dr. Franklin has provided technical advice and background information to many community groups, particularly on subjects such as pollution, radiation and, most recently, aluminum in home wiring.

In addition to "Voice of Women", she is a member of the Association of Women Electors and the Consumers Association of Canada. Until 1980, she served as a Director on the Board of Pollution Probe Foundation.

Dr. Franklin has written and co-produced radio programs on science, technology and public policy such as the Ideas Series in 1979 on Technology, Democracy and Freedom (5 one-hour programs), in 1982 on Nuclearpeace (10 one-hour programs) and in 1984 on Size and Scale in Technology (6 one-hour programs).

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
