

POL S 421 - SELECTED PROBLEMS IN CANADIAN GOVERNMENT *3 (3-0-0) Canadian

Sec. B1 - This seminar style course will deal with the topical issues of women, power and politics. Topics for discussion include an examination of women's political behavior, elite membership, participation in policy-making and the influence of feminist and non-feminist thought on Canadian politics. Course grading will consist of one short critique, one term paper and a final exam. Prerequisite: A course in political science or the consent of the instructor.

Sec. B3 - A study of the mass media in the politics of Canada and other Western democracies. Topics include: the definition of mass media, their organization, their content and effect, and their virtues and vices.

POL S 422 - CANADIAN PUBLIC POLICY *3 (3-0-0) Canadian

Sec. A1 First Term M 1300-1550 L. Pratt

In the 1984-85 academic year this course will focus on the development of Canadian energy policy since 1945. Special attention will be given to the oil and gas sector and to developments in energy since the National Energy Program. Prerequisite: Canadian politics, energy economics or permission of instructor. Maximum enrollment: 25 students.

POL S 423 - CANADIAN FEDERALISM *3 (3-0-0) Canadian

Sec. A1 First Term M 0930-1220 G. Stevenson

A seminar on Canadian federalism for students with some previous knowledge of Canadian government and politics. Specific topics considered include the federal features of The B.N.A. Act and their interpretation by the courts, the impact of socio-economic change on the federal system, the political, financial, and administrative relations between federal and provincial governments, and the efforts to contain Quebec nationalism within Canadian federalism. Prerequisite: POL S 320 or 321 or consent of the instructor.

POL S 425 - CANADIAN PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION *3 (3-0-0) Canadian

This course will acquaint senior undergraduates with some basic theories of bureaucracy, with the structure of Canada's public sector, with the policy-making process, and with critical policy choices currently facing policy-makers. The sessions devoted to case studies will hopefully stimulate the student's interest in matters of public policy and provide a fuller understanding of the manifold problems confronting Canadian governments today. Issues include federal-provincial relations, economic policy-making, fiscal and monetary policy, and personnel management.
