COURSE OUTLINE

Purpose of the Course: This course will examine the nature and implications of the female experience as it relates to the counselling of women. Using an analysis of nonsexist and feminist therapy as a base, the course will focus on issues that are specifically related to working with women. More specifically, the goals of the course are:

- (a) to develop an information base related to the implications for counselling women of (1) the relationship between sex-role stereotyping and mental health of women, (2) the relationship between psychological theory and the counselling of women and (3) selected women's issues.
- (b) to increase personal awareness of one's attitudes, values and behaviours in relation to specific women's issues.

Course Orientation: The course is designed as a seminar which will include lecture material, experiential learning and discussion. Class members are asked to share responsibility with the instructor for creating a challenging learning environment.

Assignments:

- 1. Class attendance and participation.
- 2. Personal Journal: Keep a personal journal during the course in which you record reactions to the course as a whole. Include in each submission (of approximately four pages) a critique of the readings you have done as well as your personal reaction to the experience in class. The journals present a framework for documenting both the work you are doing as well as examination of your personal process.
- 3. <u>Class Presentation</u>: This can be done individually or in small groups (2-3 students) and may follow either of the following formats:
 - a. Organize a class presentation on an issue that is relevant for counselling women. Include theoretical and research information and discuss counselling issues that are pertinent to it. A panel discussion and/or experiential class exercise may be a component

of the presentation. The written part should include a three page handout (outlining the major points of your presentation) plus an annotated bibliography of at least eight references for class distribution.

b. Develop an experiential workshop for a specific issue of concern to women and demonstrate in class. The presentation should include information (theory and research), a description of the workshop format (and why it was chosen) and a demonstration of a segment of the workshop (using volunteers from the class as group members). The written component should include a three page handout (outlining the major points of your presentation), a workshop outline plus an annotated bibliography of at least eight references for class distribution.
