Course Description: Phil. 458 Advanced Social and Political Philosophy

CONTEMPORARY FEMINIST THEORY

A course in political theory or philosophy which fully integrates questions for political philosophy.

The course will begin with an examination of some early modern philosophies (Hobbes, Locke, Rousseau) of the role of women in a properly constituted society. Most contemporary views that women have a special "place" or "role" in society, inferior to that of men, are the direct descendants of these philosophies.

Various contemporary feminist "schools of thought" will be discussed in relation to the modern tradition of political theory. These will include liberal feminism, Marxist feminism, radical feminism, and feminist socialism. In the process, there will be discussion of the basic frameworks of liberalism, Marxism, etc., as well as of feminist criticisms and contributions to each of these areas.

Feminist philosophy is a new and dynamic area which cannot avoid challenging and criticizing many important political and philosophical ideas. Active discussion of all the issues by the participants in the course, as well as a creative approach to written requirements, will be constantly encouraged.

REQUIREMENTS

Requirements will be written materials, such as essays, book reviews, discussion papers for the class, etc. Actual format will depend on the size of the class and their general background and expectations. A thorough discussion of requirements will be held in the first week of classes.

TEXTBOOKS, etc.: The main text for the course will be:
