Women's Studies Committee

I had some thoughts and concerns which crystallized only after yesterday's meeting, which I would like to convey to you:

- on the main point, it seems to me essential that something begin to happen regarding the institute. In light of past experience small steps might be best to keep mistakes small. There is no possible way to anticipate all potential mistakes.
- as a topic for research something in the area of ghettoized professions might bridge the gap between academe and community - we have librarians, home economists, nurses as does the community at large.
- my role on the committee may be a bit tenuous. I don't have the library connection in the same way as before and for SWA it

is probably sufficient to keep in touch with someone dealing with program planning. Much of the discussion on the institute regards issues which do not touch me so my interest is purely intellectual. Perhaps you and I can discuss whether or not this role is worth the time commitment.

Research Institute Process: A Community of Researchers

1. Recognizing that feminist researchers may appear in many occupations, including professors, clinical practitioners in various fields, social activists, independent thinkers whose primary work is homemaking, etc.
2. Setting a task that will bring together some of the women in that community so the institute can begin.
3. The first task could be selection of the first two or three research projects for the institute, and working out the institute structure that would make it possible to complete those projects.
4. Further tasks could involve further meetings.
5. We could accomplish this task in a full day of work, perhaps a Saturday. However, we might we wise to "book" two consecutive Saturdays to make it possible for additional work to be done, or to develop a stronger process.
6. We would need to decide who to invite to this session, where it would be held, what documents would be distributed in advance, what procedure would be used for getting possible projects to the group for discussion, how we would handle lunch and snacks, what would be done with the decisions or recommendations of the group.
7. I don't know if she is here or if she would do it, but rather than hiring a short term worker for the institute per se we might ask Sandy Susut if she would organize that meeting for some dollars.
8. Out of it should come not just the projects but the first structure of the institute, the beginning which would then evolve as we worked.
9. The lengthy document could be distributed, or the (not yet written documents) proposed earlier about the institute...they would all be seen as draft documents which this group could modify.
10. If we define this as a community of feminist researchers, we may reduce some of the categorizing problems that have plagued us. However, we still need to recognize some of the divergent interests that we may have as women, and develop an imagery for the institute which will make it possible for feminist researchers to recognize when their research is most appropriately carried out at such an institute. (In some ways the film research on the Edmonton Grads presents a partial model I think, as well as

1. Heather Jon Mulrone will be here Sept 21 to Oct 7 or 8. Shirley sees no problem in her meeting with this committee during that time, whether at a formal meeting or for lunch or coffee sometime.

2. Leslie has taken up 10 hours of duties with us, as administrative worker for the committee. The cost is a little higher than predicted, at just over \$11 an hour, and hopefully we will have less hassles with payroll over her cheque each month. She and I have met about her work.

3. Mary has not agreed to work on the research institute project. We should consider that position further. I have not yet laid out a detailed "job description."

4. There continues to be discussion about "Chez Nous". I met this week with Shirley Newman and Susan Jackel. I think we agreed that Canadian Studies and Women's Studies together would require considerably more space than that house provided. However, Women's Studies and the Research Institute might be a feasible combination, as has been noted earlier. Arts people are scrambling for space, and elbows are out all over the place.

5. Linda Fedigan has decided not to continue with this committee, and written me accordingly. Hope Olson will be here today, but would like to continue one more year; she thinks it would also be useful for Susan Pawlson to be considered for the committee.

6. I will be going to the conference on Communicating Feminist Research in Hull that I mentioned at the last meeting. It is Oct. 1. A one day meeting on Women's Studies will now precede that conference and I will also attend it. I am using my Faculty travel money, which will at least pay the air fare, and requesting some meal and accomodation costs from the organizers (if they get SSHRC money). I may still come back to the committee for \$100 or so but it should not be more than that. I will bring back information, and send them to both committees.

7. I think we should have a mailing list on campus of academics really interested or involved in women's studies in any way. (i.e. with a somewhat different purpose than the AWA mailing list). This is likely something Leslie could develop on the microcomputer if it is okay with Cathy.

Based on our study of other Women's Studies programs and our own experience, we believe that the administrative structure for an interdisciplinary Women's Studies program housed in the Faculty of Arts should be as described in this letter.

The program should be administered by a Women's Studies Committee, which should have the following membership:

- (1) (a) One representative from each academic unit (either inside or outside the Faculty of Arts) which offers a cross-listed course. Until the Committee is established and courses are formally cross-listed, we suggest that the following units have representatives on the Committee:

Anthropology
Canadian Studies
Christian Theology (St. Stephen's College)
Classics
Comparative Literature
East Asian Languages and Literature
English
Faculte St. Jean
History
Organizational Analysis
Philosophy
Political Science
Romance Languages
Slavic and East European Studies
Sociology

The representative from the unit must teach a current cross-listed course. For units in which more than one person teaches a current cross-listed course, representatives should have a two-year term (staggered over all such units for the first year after the committee is formed). This would ensure both continuity and the greatest possible exposure to the issues of concern in Women's Studies.

- (b) Persons teaching those courses comprising the Women's Studies program and with the designation W ST who are not already representing an academic unit.

- (2) Three representatives from the Advisory Committee on Women's Studies, drawn from those members of the Advisory Committee on Women's Studies who are not in Category (1) above.
- (3) Two student representatives, elected by the students in the Women's Studies Program.
- (4) Two representatives from the women's community, chosen by nomination, application or community input.
- (5) The Director of the Women's Program, Faculty of Extension, or her designate.
- (6) The Coordinator of Women's Studies in the Faculty of Arts.

We believe that this Committee should meet at least once a month during the academic year.

We also recommend that there be an Executive Committee, whose terms of reference should be set by the Women's Studies Committee. The Executive Committee should consist of one representative from each of Categories (2) through (6) above plus 3 representatives from Category (1). Members of the Executive Committee should be elected by the members of the Women's Studies Committee (though it should be noted that the Coordinator of the Women's Studies program and the Director of the Women's Program in the Faculty of Extension will automatically be members of the Executive Committee).

The Chair of the Women's Studies Committee should be selected from among the full-time academic staff members on the Committee. The Chair should serve for a two-year term. The Chair should function in a manner similar to a department chair in the Faculty of Arts.

~~The coordinator of Women's Studies will be responsible for (1) the day-to-day administration of the Women's Studies program and (2) either teaching or coordinating two of those courses comprising the Women's Studies program and with the designation W ST.~~

The Coordinator and the people teaching those courses comprising the Women's Studies program and with the designation W ST will either be seconded from their home departments or hold a joint appointment in Women's Studies and their home department. Such individuals can be drawn from any academic unit on the campus (inside or outside the Faculty of Arts; offering or not offering a cross-listed course). The maximum appointment to the Women's Studies program will be 1/2. The Women's Studies Committee will be involved in the selection of those internal individuals who will hold appointments in Women Studies, and will select representatives to the Dean's Advisory Staff Selection Committee.

Funds in the Faculty of Arts budget will be earmarked specifically for the Women's Studies program. Use of those funds will be decided by the Women's Studies Committee, and administered by the Coordinator of Women's Studies.

The Women's Studies committee can arrange that those courses comprising the Women's Studies program and with the designation W ST be made available to other academic units which develop Women's Studies programs.

A review of the Women's Studies Program in the Faculty of Arts should occur after five years.

We believe that an administrative structure such as this is needed so that the Women's Studies program will have both the autonomy and interdisciplinary nature that is necessary to ensure its success.

On behalf of the Advisory committee, I would again like to express our appreciation for the support you have given to our proposal.
