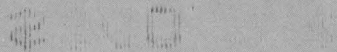
CRIAW CONFERENCE 1991

All together we have 117 copies committed. Several other (24) subscriptions are outstanding, either unpaid or invoiced, and it is unclear if they will be renewing.

Strategy:

1. Go through each file and write letter to contact each outstanding sub. and seek clarification/money.
2. To recruit other libraries.

Of the 96 subscribers, only 63 actually pay money for the index. The other 33 are "freebies" for exchange and to board members. We need to increase our subscribers. Libraries are definitely the target audience, not individuals. I suggest that we do some marketing in the months ahead.

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Instructions to Facilitators, CRIAW
Kaffee Klatsch, Friday evening 8-10 pm,
CRIAW Conference 1991, Westin Hotel

Thank you for agreeing to facilitate the discussion at one of the tables for the Kaffee Klatsch the first evening of the CRIAW conference, Friday November 8, 1991, 8-10 pm. The "Kaffee Klatsch" is a rotating discussion event, the purpose of which is to get to know each other, find out something about the work we are doing, discuss some issues, and have a good time. There will not be any reporting back or plenary function for the evening.

Here is how the Kaffee Klatsch will operate: In the large room there will be about 30 tables, each one with a number, seating 10 participants. These table numbers correspond to a list in your Kaffee Klatsch programme, which you will pick up at the Registration or the door to the Kaffee Klatsch room. Suppose you are the facilitator for a table that is to discuss in English (only) the question: Should women take over the sciences? What will happen if we do? If we don't? Look at the programme and find that table 8 is assigned to discuss that question in English: that is your table. (Likewise, if you are leading a Bilingual discussion of the question (How) can women's art/images change any/everything? note that your table is, say, table 20, not table 22 which discusses the same question in English only.) Go to your table and remain there until the Kaffee Klatsch ends at 10 pm. There will be three 30-minute discussion periods; when one is signalled to begin, participants will take their coffee or tea to the table with the topic and language of their choice, and remain there until the end of the period. You will facilitate three 30-minute rounds of discussion, for three different groups of participants. (Some may choose to remain, that's okay.)

You are asked to facilitate a discussion, NOT to present a paper or offer the final word. You do NOT have to take notes, summarise the discussion at the end, or report to anyone. Your job is to ask the participants to introduce themselves at the beginning, then to make sure that every participant at your table has a share of the munchies, a chance to speak, that the usual elementary rules of verbal good conduct are followed (participants don't interrupt, no personal attacks or putdowns, listen, say "I disagree" instead of "you are wrong or stupid"), that the group remains more or less on topic, and that everyone has a good time. Each table is designated for the language(s) of discussion. If your table is Bilingual, each participant may speak in French or English (or both) as she chooses. There is no translation provided (although if someone gets stuck she can ask someone to help her out or clarify), and participants need to be able to understand both languages sufficiently to be comfortable in the discussion. If your table is only French, or only English, participants must be able to speak and understand comfortably (perfection not required) in the designated language (of course if someone needs a bit of help, other participants will certainly help her.)

Similar sessions at other conferences have shown that what goes on at these tables ranges from serious discussion to anarchy to amateur comedy skits. We hope you enjoy doing this, we hope the munchies and everyone's energy are in plentiful supply. Thank you for agreeing to facilitate a Kaffee Klatsch table.

**Minutes of CRIAW/ICREF '91 Committee Meeting
August 8th, 1991**

ATTENDING: Marilyn Assheton-Smith, Laurie Blakeman, Sushila Samy, Barbara Roberts, Carol Murray, Marcelline Forestier

1. Budget revisions:

The meeting began with an update on the budget. Laurie informed us that our deficit now stands at -4903.00. Upon reviewing the budget, the following comments and clarifications were made:

B. Roberts mentioned that Athabasca University would be giving us \$200.00 more to bring their total grant to \$3000.00.

\$6000.00 has been cut from salaries which previously totalled \$22,000, publicity and brochures costs which previously totalled \$12,500 has been cut to \$7500.00.

Laurie requested that we review the price of meals to assure ourselves that this amount is correct.

Marilyn noted that speaker fees should read speaker costs.

Laurie also suggested that we calculate cost of audio-visual technician in our a/v equipment cost.

Laurie will continue to revise the budget and update us at forthcoming meetings.

2. Fundraising

Sushila reported that she contacted following organizations:

Secretary of State: no commitment as yet on money from regional level

Women's Bureau, Labour Canada: money not available (there is a bursary program called "Marion V. Roy" but deadline for applications was March 31st).

Alberta Government Telephones: Marilyn and Barbara suggest they will work together on organizing a "feminist electronic workshop" and go after funding from AGT

Health and Welfare: no money available but perhaps a workshop dealing specifically with seniors would enable us to get money from "New Horizons"

Edmonton Community Foundation: their deadline has passed and if we do apply we would not receive money before the conference

Marilyn also mentioned that she is actively approaching various groups and organizations as well as her U of A contacts to solicit funds in any way, shape or form.

3. Report from Marcelline:

Marcelline was away on holidays from July 8th to July 23rd. Mail-out of registration packages occurred week of July 15th. Mailout included CRIAW membership, Alberta Advisory Council, MATCH, Womens' Research Centre, Women's Studies Association and Women's Resource Centre. Postage for last two listed was paid by Athabasca University.

Time was spend on revision of Julie Anne's files, revision of budget, various responses to correspondance and requests received in the office.

Request for \$4000.00 was sent to CRIAW national. We have \$3000.00 to come for a total of \$15,000.

Met with Peggie Graham regarding publicity. Publicity campaign will be threefold:

1. August: sending out a blurb to newsletters and periodicals asking them to announce our conference in their upcoming events
2. Mid-september: news release to be sent to all media announcing "CRIAW is coming..."
3. Mid-October: second news release "Here's what you'll miss if you're not there..."

Handbills will be distributed during Fringe and other upcoming events, working on getting a poster made, will set up interviews on various radio and t.v. programs.

Marcelline mentions that it is very important that committee members do everything possible to promote the conference - offer yourselves as speakers to various activities, conferences, hand out information about the conference and just generally be very pro-active in the promotion of our event.

RESUME:

Over 350 women attended the conference at the Westin Hotel in Edmonton, November 8-10, 1991. The conference provided academic and community women with an excellent opportunity to share their concerns, their interests and ideas regarding women's research in Canada and indeed, around the world. Many issues including removal of barriers to women's success, encouragement for women to take a more active and prominent role within society and support for career and educational opportunities for women were discussed throughout the conference.

A major purpose of CRIAW conferences is to bring together the research concerns of academic and community women. These two groups or "solitudes" as they have been called, all too often do their research work and action in isolation from each other. Opportunities for bridging and integrating are few, usually taking place between individuals or through local organizations such as the co-sponsoring Misener-Margetts Women's Research Centre. One of CRIAW's major roles is to provide a national forum for such bridging and integrating. As such, each annual conference is a unique opportunity for Canadian women from all provinces and territories, as well as women from other countries, to come together to exchange and share diverse research interests and concerns around a certain theme.

DESCRIPTION OF PARTICIPANTS:

The conference attracted participants from across Canada, including all provinces and both territories. As well, CRIAW national received funding from CIDA to coordinate and facilitate a "Western Tour" of representatives from women's networking organizations in the Third World who are engaged in action-research. Hence there were representatives from the Philippines, Bangladesh, Africa and Guyana.

Most, although not all, participants were women working with universities, community women and women working with government departments and agencies. University women included academic staff and students. Community women included some with very low incomes.

Special effort was made to promote the conference among francophones, women with disabilities, Aboriginal women and women representing visible minority groups. The composition of the conference committee reflected a conscious effort to include representatives of the above groups in the planning and implementation of the project. Many participants commented on the truly bilingual nature of the conference as well as the diversity of women present at the conference.

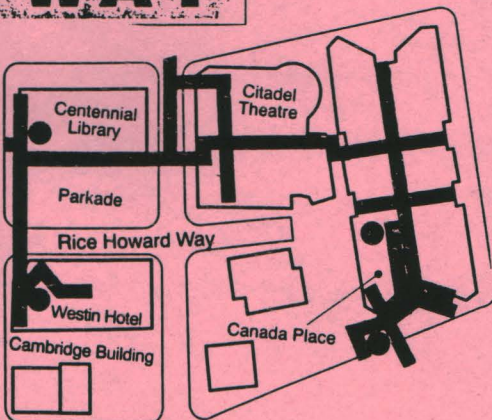
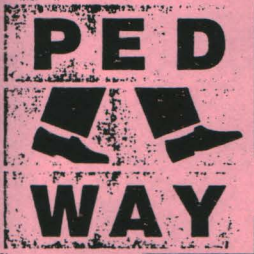
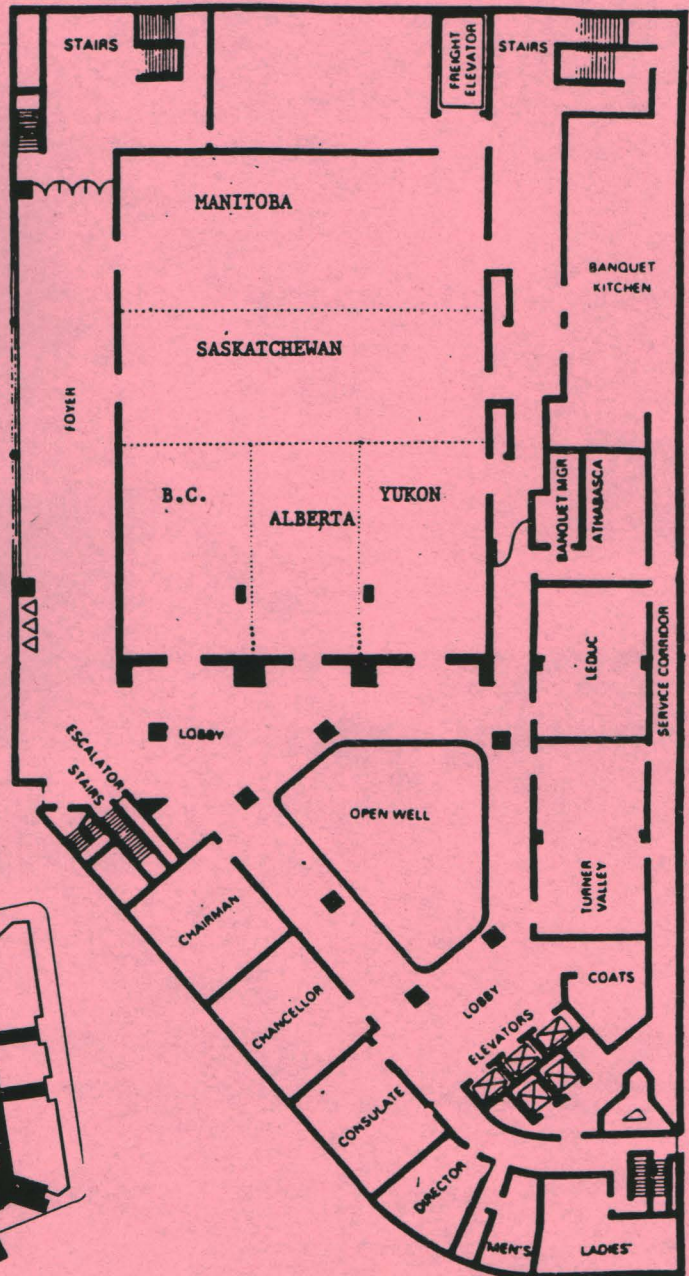
