Friends:

Greetings from the Alberta Women's Newsmagazine collective. This survey is to determine the need and expectations for a women's magazine published and addressing issues faced by women in Alberta.

A women's press is important because our voices are not regularly or clearly heard in the mainstream media. It should cover news, interpret and discuss events from women's perspectives and serve to link women and women's organizations. In addition it would act as an historical record of the work and achievements of women.

Our plans are to publish every six weeks, although initially this may not be possible, with the first issue printed in September or October. We will be soliciting feature articles, fiction, art etc., etc. (with funding it may be possible to pay for materials published). In this mock up cover of the magazine we have included examples of the kind of advertising we hope to have - community based and of interest to women. Eventually an Alberta Women's Yellow Pages may be produced. If you are interested in submitting articles or advertising please contact us.

Two final points to be made. The first concerns the name of the magazine. The collective has been using "Alberta Women's Newsmagazine" as a working title. We would welcome suggestions for an alternative. The other point is regarding the cover. Initially a series of photographs of women in Alberta's history will be run. However, with contributions we would like to develop a collection of photographs from our readers to use on the front cover.

Hopefully you will find the idea of an Alberta Women's Newsmagazine as exciting as we do and assist us in making it a reality by filling out this survey. We would appreciate the return of your completed questionnaire to 11517 95A Street, Edmonton, Alberta by June twenty first. 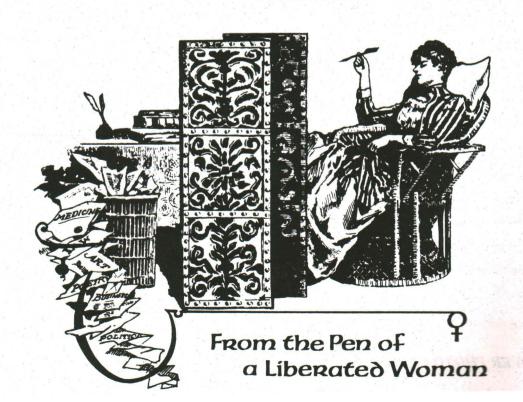

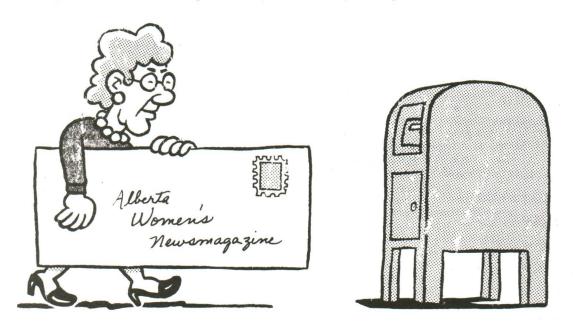
