Dear friends,

A dream of many women is becoming a reality: a Canadian Women's Health Network is being formed. Women Healthsharing, a feminist organization which promotes women's health through publicizing the quarterly magazine Healthsharing, has received funds from Health and Welfare Canada to begin to establish links between organizations, groups and individuals throughout Canada working on issues which affect women's health.

This three year project aims to lay the groundwork for the network in three ways:

- *We will gather information about women's health activities and organizations in six Canadian regions to create a current resource bank.
- *An issue of <u>Healthsharing</u> will be devoted to each of the six regions, which will include the region's resource bank, and will be freely distributed within the region.
- *We will organize a Canada-wide conference on women's health which will focus on sharing resources, linking our struggles, and determining a structure and direction for the network.

Hopefully by the end of this project the network would have developed focus and momentum to organize an ongoing structure and future projects.

This is an opportunity for women to share resources, analysis, vision, and strategies for change. Links can be made between women's health and social problems such as poverty, sexism, racism, and heterosexism. We will do everything we can to help the network develop in a way that represents and includes the concerns of women from diverse classes, races, cultures, sexual orientations, ages and physical abilities.

We are pleased that the western region, Alberta and British Columbia, will be focused on first. The western issue of Healthsharing will be out in May 1992.

We hope that you will help to form the network. To begin, please complete the following questions about your work, your community, and goals for the network. We look forward to hearing from you, by January 24th if possible.

Building a Canadian Women's Health Network

The following questions will be used to build a resource bank for the western region of the Canadian Women's Health Network, and also to influence planning for the Canada-wide consultation slated for the fall of 1992. Dear friend(s),

Although we are confronting many issues which tax our strength and challenge our endurance, I am writing to you with a small piece of good news about the development of a new HIV/AIDS educational resource for women. First, let me introduce myself: my name is Brenda Macevicius, and I am a volunteer with the Women's Project of the AIDS Committee of Ottawa. I am also in the process of completing my research (for a Master's degree in Social Work) on the topic of HIV prevention for women. A few weeks ago, I was contracted to work with the Sexuality Information and Resources Clearing House (SIRCH), on a national survey of the quality of HIV/AIDS educational resources for women used by educators and service providers in the field of birth planning/birth control. The results of this survey will determine the nature of a new educational resource to be produced in 1992.

I hope that you will want to influence the development of this new resource. If you are working directly in the field of birth planning/ birth control or if you talk to women about the wide range of topics relevant to this field (i.e. STDs, sexuality, intimacy, relationships, etc.), then it is essential that we add your voice to the feedback we give to Health and Welfare in January 1992 in our survey analysis and recommendations. The producers of new resources need to benefit from your experience and knowledge.

Briefly, the purpose of the study is to find out:

- (a) what resources you use
- (b) what good resources exist
- (c) what makes some resources better/more useful than others
- (d) what type of new resources need to be developed

Furthermore, given the development of the Sexuality Information and Resource Clearinghouse, we ask you to send a copy of each of the educational resources, specific to women and HIV/AIDS, that your organisation has produced— as well as those which you use in your work and would recommend for our collection.

I would greatly appreciate it, if you, or the appropriate person in your organization, would complete the survey and return it in the self-addressed envelope. I realize that you may not have much time to respond to a survey, but we really need your input. Funding is available for the development of a new resource IF we can make recommendations, based on the survey results, by the end of January. Therefore, please respond as early in the New Year as possible.

THE SEXUALITY INFORMATION AND RESOURCES CLEARING HOUSE (SIRCH)

SIRCH

SIRCH is a new agency, initiated with the support of the Planned Parenthood Federation of Canada and funding from Health and Welfare Canada. Currently being established, its databases will provide information and referrals on request across Canada. SIRCH will also publish and reprint high quality Canadian resources on sexuality and reproductive health. SIRCH is also building a national depository collection of all sexuality education resources (print, A/V, kits, cassettes, directories, handouts, pamphlets, brochures, posters, etc., etc.) produced in Canada. To ensure that materials produced by Canadian organisations active in this field, are included in the databases for referral and promotion, SIRCH is requesting one copy of each resource published or produced since 1985 be sent to the SIRCH depository collection.

Women and AIDS education in Canada

At the present time in Canada there is still no public sense of HIV prevention for women. The implications are far-reaching: women do not perceive themselves to be at risk; women are contracting the virus in increasing numbers; women's presentation of AIDS-related symptomatology goes misdiagnosed; women are dying faster of AIDS; and so on.

Are most women even aware of the threat that HIV poses to their own health? How do we, as women, protect ourselves (from getting the virus, or from getting sick if we already have the virus)?

Women's lives have been undervalued and ignored for far too long in the AIDS crisis. This survey seeks to acknowledge the inter-connectedness of HIV with many other aspects of women's lives. Its goal is the development of a new resource that is meaningful and relevant to women.

The Need for New Resource Development

One of the main mandates of SIRCH is to facilitate the production of high quality, appropriate and sensitive resources in Canada. Obviously, educational resources are not the only resources needed to address the impact of HIV/AIDS on women's lives. However, the funding provided to SIRCH for this survey enables us to compile information about HIV/AIDS educational resources for women, with the ultimate aim of developing a new high quality resource to meet the needs of educators and counsellors working in the birth planning/birth control field. Two promising features of this new resource are that it will make the connections between birth planning/birth control and safer sex and will be developed from a woman-centered perspective.
