ADDITION AND CHANGE TO 1982-83 COURSE GUIDE:

C.Lit. 366 - Women in World Literature Second Term: E.D. Blodgett, M W F 1200 to 1250

The purpose of this course is to examine and discuss writings, in English translation, by and about women from Antiquity to the twentieth century. Two specific problems will be considered. The first will be the critical assumptions with which evaluations and judgements are made concerning women in literature. The second will be the kinds of strategies women have had to employ to reach their readers. Texts will include such works and authors as the following:

a Greek tragedy; a mediaeval French romance and/or selected <u>Lays</u> of Marie de France; Louise Labé; Mme de Lafayette; Georges Sand; Charlotte Brontë; Gustave Flaubert; Theodor Fontane; Henrik Ibsen; Emily Dickinson and selections from other modern poets; Isak Dinesen; short fiction.
