



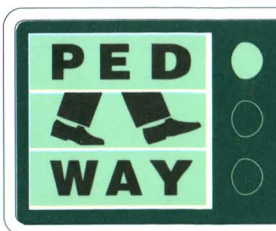
The pedway sign reflects Edmonton's three levels of pedways:

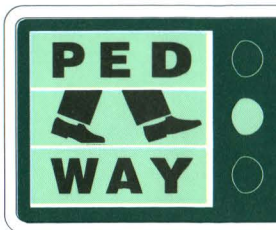

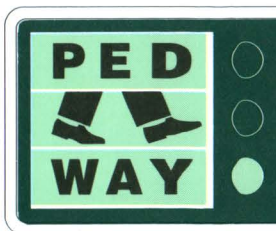
From the outside of a building, the **dots** on the sign tell you where to find the pedway inside the building:

WHAT IS A KAFFEE KLATSCH?

The "kaffee klatsch" is a traditional women's get-together for visiting and discussion of topics of interest. We have chosen the name for this rotating discussion event, which is intended to help us get to know each other, find out something about the work we are doing, discuss some issues, and have a good time. There will not be any formal reporting-back, note taking, or plenary function for this evening.

Here's How It Works:

You will note there are 30 tables, each seating 10, in the large Banquet Hall. Each table has a number; each number indicates a discussion question AND the language(s) that will be in use at that table. (See below.) Each table has a discussion facilitator. There will be three 30-minute discussion periods; when one is signalled to begin, participants will take their coffee or tea to the table that has the topic and language of their choice, and remain there until the end of that 30-minute period. This is repeated for three rounds.

The facilitators will invite participants to introduce themselves, make sure everyone has a chance to participate, help the proceedings flow smoothly, and try to assure that everyone has a good time. Nobody is expected to present a paper or be an "expert;" this is completely informal. The topics are intended to provoke discussion. Controversy is welcome, as long as the rules of verbal good conduct are observed. At other conferences where similar events have taken place, some tables get quite serious, others anarchic, others end up doing impromptu comedy skits or laughing too hard to talk coherently.

Choosing your table:

Please note that each table has a topic and designated language(s) of discussion. Language: No translation is provided (although if anyone gets stuck, someone will certainly help her out). It is not necessary to be perfectly fluent in the language of the table of your choice; just comfortable. At the bilingual tables, participants may choose to speak in either language or both (they will need to understand both, however). Topic: no one need be an expert to choose a particular topic; just interested.

If you prefer individual discussion:

You may decide to sit out a round and chat with someone. If you wish to do this, **please move outside the Banquet Hall** even if you are planning to exchange only a few words. We are a large group and even a little added volume can increase the noise level to the point where participants at the Kaffee Klatsch tables will not be able to hear each other.

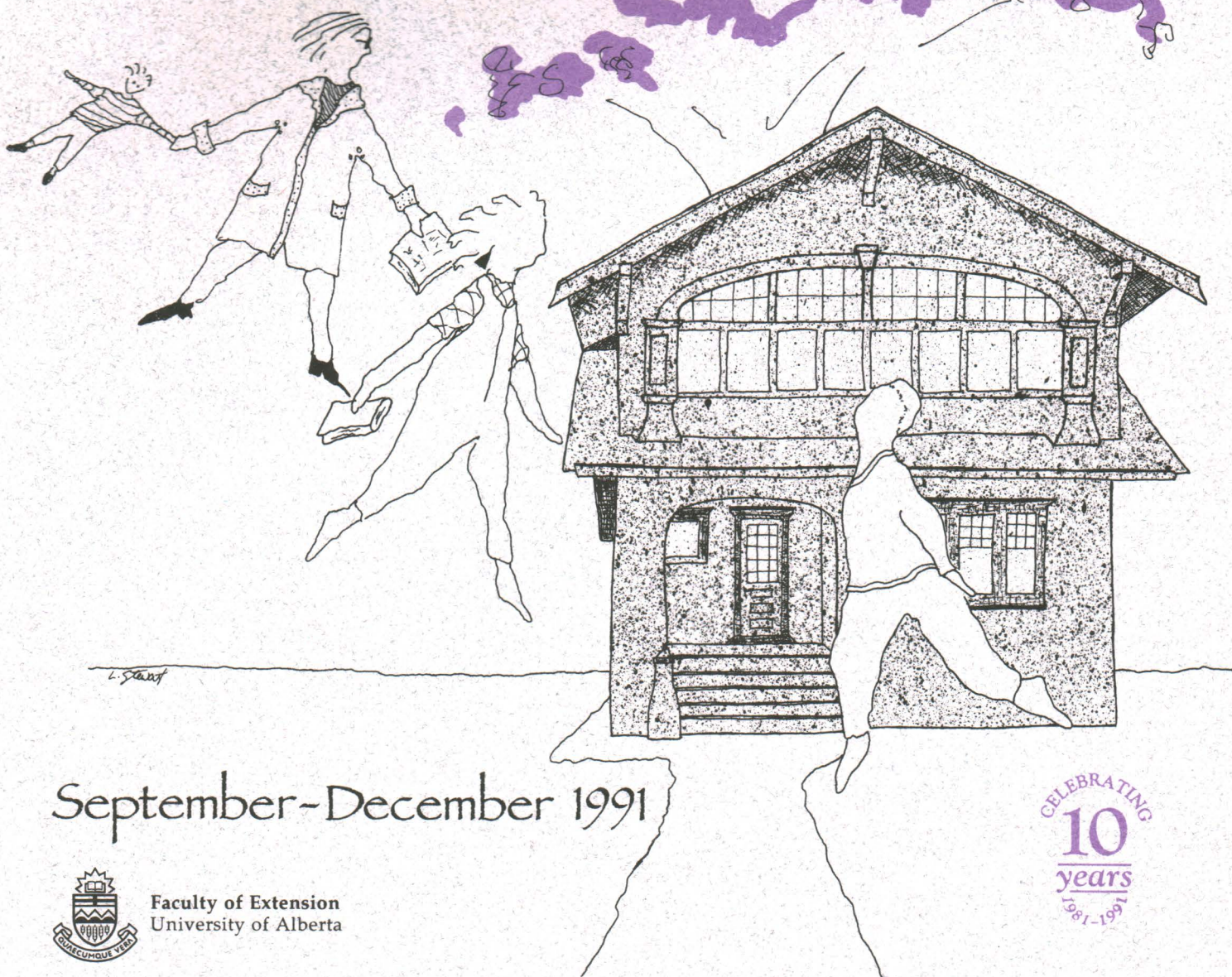

This fall marks the 10th anniversary of the Women's Program and Resource Centre, and the decade has been, for us, an exciting and a challenging one. Our list of courses has continually expanded and our goals have been extended during the past decade, and we are grateful for the ideas and the support we have received from the women's community all across the province.

In recent years, the majority of our courses have been in the realm of personal development, and while we will continue to offer a diverse selection of these courses, this fall we will be venturing into new areas. The Counselling Women Certificate Program is our most comprehensive new project, and is designed for women who help women. It will be phased in during the next two years, with the first core course starting this September. Courses initially will be offered face to face, but our scheduling is designed to increase accessibility for students from outlying areas. By the fall of 1993, we expect to start offering the program to distance

In addition to courses and workshops, we have scheduled three public forums. Your attendance is welcome as we identify and discuss salient issues to women regarding the subjects of housing, AIDS and entrepreneurship. In conjunction with the Women's Research Centre in Edmonton, we will be hosting the 15th annual conference of the Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women (CRIAOW), at the Westin Hotel in Edmonton, in November. Join us for a study of constitutional concerns and strategies, among other topics.

All this activity at the Women's Program and Resource Centre is taking place amidst a climate of fiscal constraint and restructuring at the University of Alberta. The base funding from the University to the Faculty of Extension has been severely cut back in 1991-92. Similar annual reductions in the Faculty's base budget will continue until 1996. As a direct result of these cutbacks, fees for extension courses have been increased. However, we will

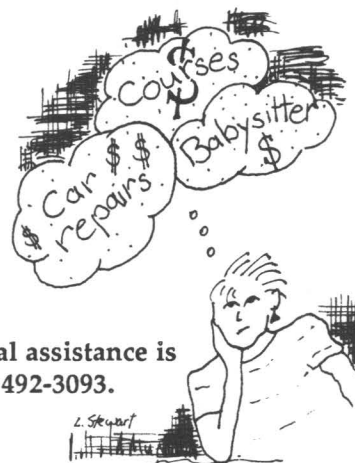

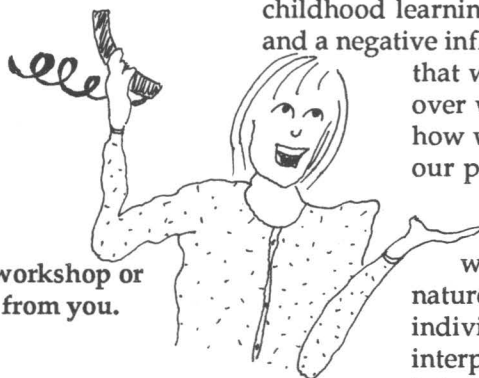

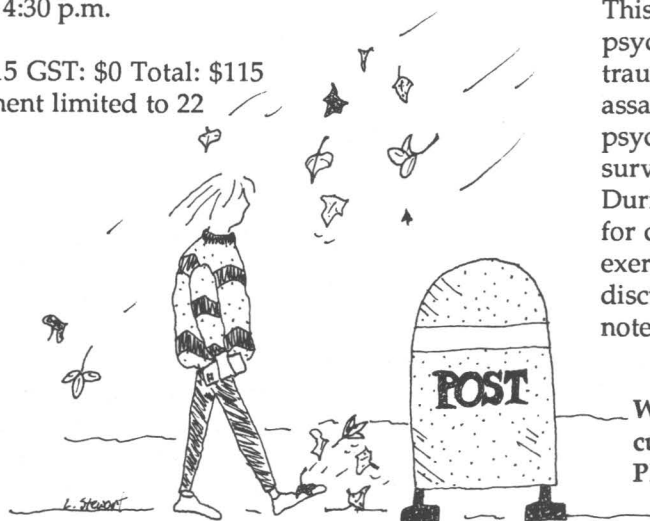

COUNSELLING WOMEN CERTIFICATE PROGRAM 1991-92

What is this all about?

The Counselling Women Certificate Program is an educational program which combines contemporary feminist theory with the practice of counselling. The rationale which underpins this program can best be described in the following statements:

Women deserve high quality counselling services which validate, nurture, support and empower them, perpetuate values of fairness, equality, peace, harmony, self-respect, health and growth, and which value women's life experiences and knowledge. Traditional approaches to counselling are not women-centred. Alternative approaches are required. Feminist theory offers a basis for these new women-centred approaches. By increasing the knowledge and skills of counselling practitioners, the quality of counselling services available to women will increase.

For the purposes of this program, counselling refers to helping women solve specific and everyday problems. This is not the same as providing therapy. Therapy is also a helping relationship, but it involves more in-depth work, usually over a longer period of time and it requires more theoretical knowledge, highly refined skills and experience on the part of the therapist. Good counsellors learn when to refer clients for therapy.

Who will benefit from this program?

This program is designed for part-time students who want to develop and enhance their knowledge and skills in helping women. If you are a nurse, teacher, from a shelter or sexual assault centre, a crisis worker, social worker, family life educator, adult educator, or vocational counsellor, you will find the program both relevant and timely.

You will be encouraged to think critically about the assumptions that underpin various approaches to counselling, and have the opportunity to learn how to apply feminist approaches to counselling.

The teaching-learning environment will be interactive, and will include validation of women's life experiences and knowledge. By bringing students, instructors, practitioners and other resource people together, we will discover and share knowledge and skills which can be used to effectively work with women.

What courses are included in the program?

The program consists of a minimum of 264 hours of instruction. All successful students will complete five compulsory core courses, totalling 216 hours, plus 48 hours of electives. The first core course is being offered in the fall of 1991. The other four core courses will be phased in during the next two years, and the first participants of the program will graduate in the spring of 1993. Thereafter, the program will normally take one to two years to complete, with a maximum of five years allowed.

Core Courses

Registration for core courses may only be done once you have been accepted into the program. Please call our office at 492-3093 to obtain a schedule of core courses for 1991/92.

A. Women: Psychology, Sociology and Feminist Thought (39 hours)

This course provides an opportunity to study the history of feminist thought, women's social and psychological development, and how oppression is reproduced in our everyday world.

B. Feminist Approaches to Counselling Women (39 hours)

This will be an examination of the assumptions, values, and beliefs that underpin feminist approaches to counselling, and will include contrast between feminist and traditional approaches. Emphasis will be on skill development.

C. Advanced Theory and Practise of Feminist Approaches to Counselling Women (39 hours)

In this course, you learn how women are affected by multiple oppressions of race, age, class, sexual orientation and ability, and how our own beliefs, attitudes and socialization affect how we counsel. You will learn how to separate your own issues from the counselling relationship.

D. Women and the Law (39 hours)

This course will be a discussion of legislation, government policies and programs that affect women, and how to educate and inform women of our rights and responsibilities. You will have the chance to explore your role as an advocate.

E. Practicum in Counselling Women (60 hours)

This is an opportunity to apply your newly acquired knowledge and skills in a supportive environment, and to receive constructive feedback and guidance.

Elective Courses

Electives will be offered as one or two-day workshops, and are designed to allow detailed consideration of specific topics. Elective courses currently offered by the Women's Program and Resource Centre can be found on page 10 and 11. New electives will be created to meet the needs of students in the certificate program.

What does a certificate mean?

While completion of the program does not confer professional counselling status, it will enable you to successfully apply feminist approaches to counselling women. A certificate indicates that you have a comprehensive understanding of women's issues, and the skills required to be helpful to women. A certificate will help both consumers of counselling services and employers to identify counsellors who have knowledge and skills relevant to the needs of women. (Students seeking professional degrees are advised to pursue studies in degree granting programs.)

Who is eligible for admission to the program?

Admission to the program requires that you:

- 1) have at least six months experience working, in a paid or unpaid capacity, with women;
- 2) are familiar with the language and skills of basic counselling and know how to convert theory into practice; and
- 3) have successfully completed an introductory psychology course.

If you do not meet all admission requirements, or have concerns or questions, please contact the Women's Program and Resource Centre.

How do I apply?

To register you will need to complete an Application for Admission form, and submit a \$50 registration fee. Applications will be considered on a first-come first-served basis. Closing date for applications for admission to the fall term is June 15 and for the winter term is November 1. If you are an eligible applicant, you will be required to attend an interview prior to admission. If your application is approved, you will be notified and requested to confirm your intention to participate.

Who teaches the courses?

All instructors have graduate degrees and many are practising feminist counsellors and therapists. All have a strong commitment to an interactive teaching-learning process.

How much does the program cost?

Basic costs included a \$50 registration fee, \$245 for each of the five core courses, plus course fees for the electives. (Fees for electives vary depending on format.) Advanced standing for previous learning may offset some of these costs. Call the office for more details.

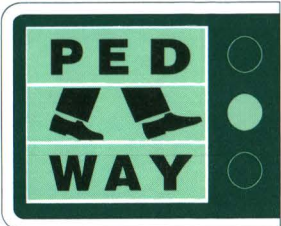

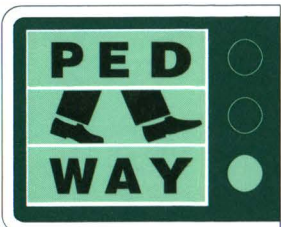

Membership is open to all who share its goals and objectives.

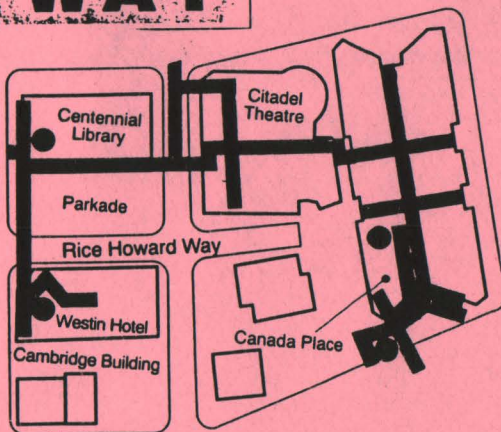
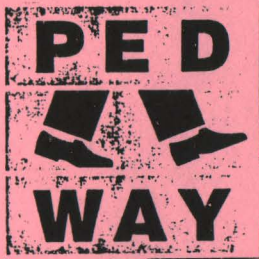
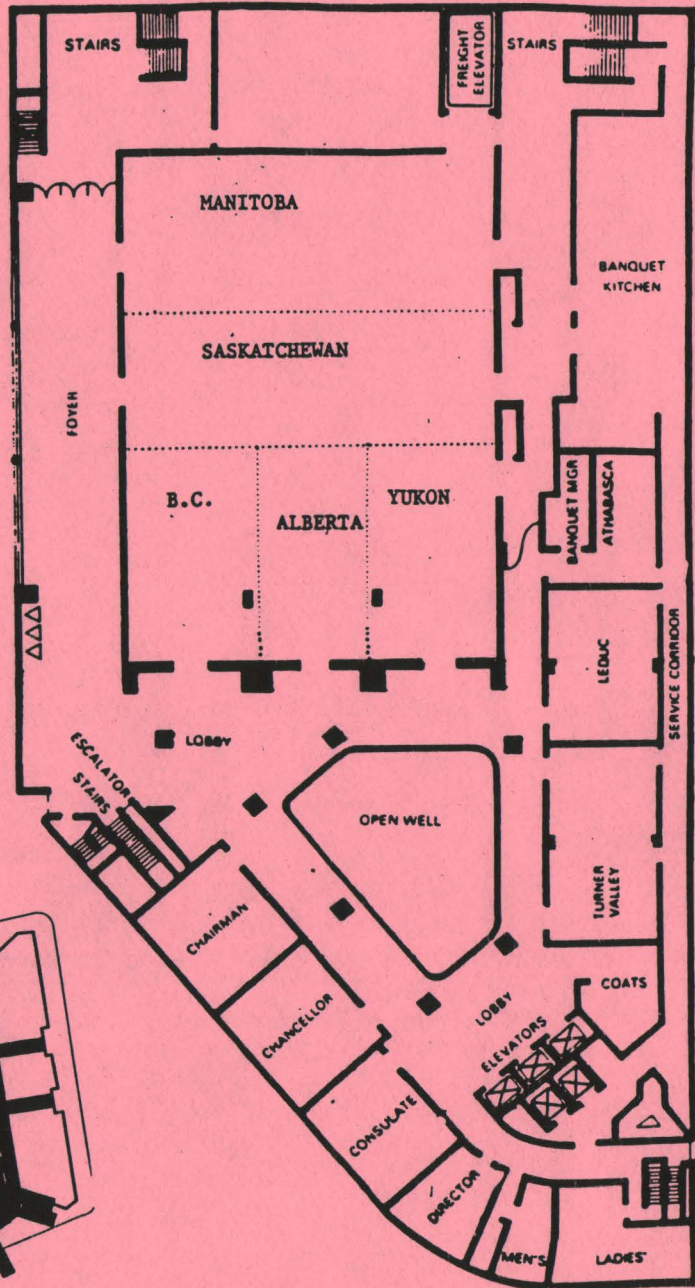
